
Irene had us enthralled by her use of all the small scraps of wood she had collected and transformed into shoes and candle stick holders. Its just goes to show you what a little imagination can achieve. It also transpired that while Joe may be a rep for Aldi Irene it seems is a rep for Craft Supplies judging by the amount of plugs she gave for their huge range of accessories. But I'm not sure if they supplied the bra used in the demo it looked like a Cross your Heart model or so I'm told!! It had the extra strong straps for the larger load bearing required in certain situations although I don't think the manufacturers envisaged it supporting a nova chuck and various other accessories in the other cup. Irene proceeded with her demo using the Fox Mini lathe and demonstrated how to turn a letter opener and the various problems that can be encountered. Irene turns the bulk of the handle and blade section between centres and then uses a band saw or belt sander to shape the blade section to its finished profile. This is nice project for a beginner as it can be carried out on any small lathe and uses up small scraps of wood which would otherwise be discarded.

Irene expressed some reservations about the Fox mini lathe as she felt it might be limited in its capacity to handle medium sized blanks and perhaps would be better suited to pen making and the like. Having finished the letter opener Irene moved on to her make up bag and once again showed her level of imagination and ingenuity. Practically every item used for applying makeup had been adapted ,tooth brush for crevice cleaning, face powder for hiding those hard to remove scratch marks, lip stick for that little bit of colour and a hair brush for ,well brushing her hair of course!

Hints and Tips

Mick Byrne has suggested using an old hacksaw frame in conjunction with a piece of wire to produce burnt lines on a wooden bowl etcetera. By fixing the wire to the pins normally used to secure the hacksaw blade, the wire can then be tensioned using the frame adjusting screw and applied to your bowl. He has also used a junior hacksaw with the blade reversed in the frame to produce fine lines on a piece. I have found cutting a very fine groove with the point of a skew can help prevent the wire slipping out of place when applying burnt lines as decoration.

The Beginner's Guide to Survival, Part 3.

Adapt It Yourself.

The beginner, as well as needing a Do-It-Yourself attitude and learning a Make-It-Yourself approach, will soon find it necessary to become an Adapt-It-Yourself person.

Bearing in mind the restraints on your budget - referred to previously - the beginner will find lots of ways to make turning more comfortable as well as more effective.

The concept of comfort may not be foremost in your mind in the early days of turning, but it should be. My late father-in-law, a skilled cabinetmaker as well as a practical house builder, never tired of telling me how important it was to make sure you were not putting obstacles in your way; in short, making sure you were comfortable. Remembering what he had said I wondered at an early stage why I was getting a pain across my shoulders after quite short spells at the lathe. The answer was obvious; I was stooping all the time. It was the work of only half an hour to raise and remount the lathe on sturdy blocks - no more aches and pains!

Well almost none, but the dry mouth and dust-filled nose indicated that as well as a mask I needed some form of dust extraction. As the extraction systems on the market were beyond my pocket, I had to go into adapt mode. At that time a well known discount chain were offering a "transfer unit" to attach to vacuum cleaners. You could use these to hoover up the ashes from your fire-place, and the dirt would be gathered in a metal container instead of in the cleaner. I have now bought and adapted this unit and the business end, instead of sucking up ashes, is whisking away the fine sanding dust from whatever work-piece is on the lathe. The challenge of coming up with a way of mounting the extraction tube, so that it had an adjustable movement in two directions, was almost as enjoyable as subsequent turning projects - almost, but not quite.

Bits and Pieces.

Without any heavy outlay of euro, it is possible to have a lot of fun looking out for odds and ends to make you turning go with a swing. For example, Irene Christie, demonstrating at the March meeting, showed us a practical wood turners use for every item in her "make-up" bag.

I had read several references in books and journals to the use of double-sided tape to hold a work-piece to a wooden disc. However most cautioned that it was difficult to get a strong safe purchase with normally available tapes. I was delighted to find that the makers of "No More Nails" adhesive have brought out a double-sided tape that has worked really well for me. (It is made by Unibond, and comes in two strengths, so go for the Ultra Strong.) I am only claiming it worked for me; if *you* use it, on your own head be it!

As I write this, an e-mail from Aldi arrives announcing a special offer of a 40W Model Building and Engraving kit for just under 15 euro. A Dremel it certainly won't be, but it sounds just like something I would classify under "bits and pieces". I wonder will there be many Chapter members ahead of me in the queue.

Tool Edges.

It can come as a bit of a shock to most of us beginners to find that putting, and keeping, an edge on your tools can be even more complex than turning wood. The cost of edging systems seem prohibitive, at least any of those that the advanced turners recommend. And it is not just the cost that is daunting. Books and journal articles seem to make us even more perplexed.

How do we come to terms with the choices, and even with the language? Wet or dry systems? Edges, bevels and facets! Wheels or belts? Honing, stropping, burnishing and linishing!!! Are burns good or bad?

Stones, diamonds and star-wheels?

Could the Chapter help us out on some of these problems? How about setting aside a short time at the end of the monthly demonstrations to give mini-workshops on sharpening/edging of tools? Better still, let some of the beginners bring along some of their botched edges to have them rectified by the experts. Imagine the joy of having someone put the perfect edge on your fingernail profile gouge (Your wha, Gay?) How about it?
