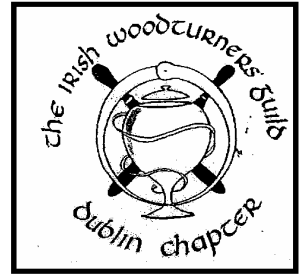

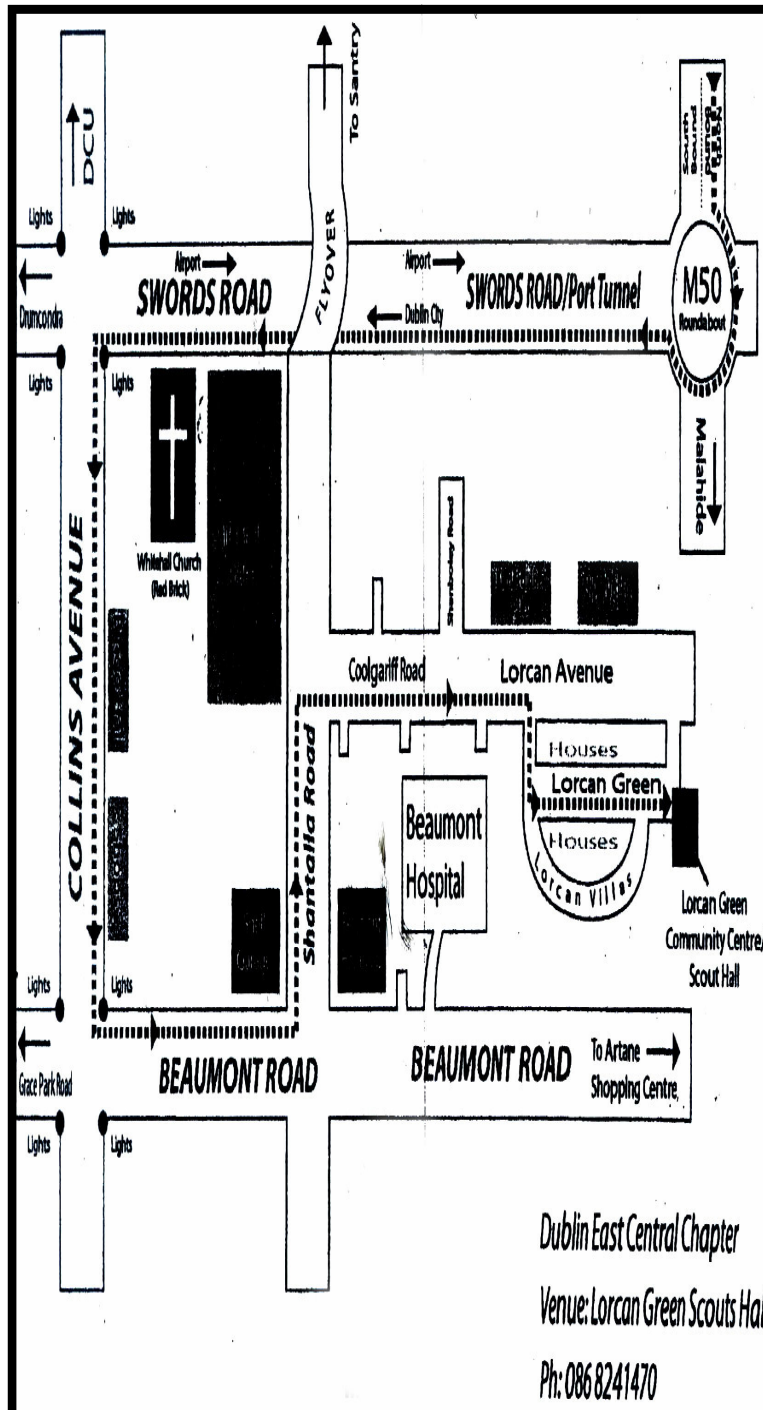
I have enjoyed my term as chairman and I would like to thank all those people who have helped ensure the success of all our endeavours through out the year and who have given me such support along the way.

## The Beginner's Guide to Survival, Part 7.

### The Challenge of Competition.

It was announced at the August chapter meeting that the competition pieces for September and October were a natural edge bowl, and an off-centre candlestick. At least one beginner was filled with a sense of horror and apprehension at the prospect of taking on these tasks. However I cheered up somewhat at the thought that the chapter's Library would once again provide some basic 'how-to' information on the subjects.

It was also helpful to note that this month's demonstrator was Peter Mulvaney. It was Peter's demo just 12 months ago that had provided the know-how to use a router to apply fluting to a turned piece - and hadn't I just entered a piece in this month's competition with a beautifully (in my opinion) fluted handle. So, courage should be the watchword - just keep tuning in to the experts, and if we really listen and watch, we can all learn to tackle any task - however daunting it may seem at first.

### Tips, Tools and Techniques.

Although he had been called on at short notice, Peter fitted in a substantial number of techniques in the time available. He concentrated on making items in quantity and how to simplify long production runs. Among the items he dashed off were small spindles, decorative rosettes, door knobs, a thimble and some dowels.

He also handed around some stair spindles he will be reproducing in quantity and noted that it is not necessary to exactly duplicate shapes and measurements. Rather than go boggle-eyed from constant use of callipers it is possible to do an excellent job that will at least match up to the work done by the original craftsman.

The following is by no means a full description of the demonstration; it is just a superficial attempt to jot down some of the bits and pieces that a beginner can pick up by listening and looking.

**The Skew.** Like many others I rarely use the skew chisel, and when I do I find I am so sure I will 'dig in' that I grip it in the classical 'white knuckle' method - and of course make a mess of things. Peter went from a square blank to a well finished spindle using only a skew, and this certainly would encourage anyone to try again. In addition he gave us a sketch of the correct 'slope' to which it should be ground, and the angle (45 degrees) between the tool face and the axis of the work piece.

I had previously suspected that there must be a relationship between the width of the skew and the diameter of the work - you surely can't use a one inch skew on a 12 inch cylinder! Peter recommended a maximum ratio of 2.5 to 1.

**Repetition.** He demonstrated a number of wrinkles for making life easier when doing multiples of a job. These were not rocket science, but very useful tips to remember. He showed us a number of 'cup-chucks' he has made from nylon. One had a sloped recess cut in the face, and it was the work of seconds to slip one end of pre-cut spindle blanks into the headstock chuck, and bring up the homemade gadget in the tailstock to get a firmly centred piece every time.

He also marked the relevant work points by using masking tape on the tool-rest. As long as he did not move the rest he did not have to mark each spindle.

**Rosettes.** Using 3" blanks of MDF it was the work of minutes to cut profiles using a specially shaped scraper. This was presented straight-on to the wood, and with the help of some judicious 'wiggling' of the tool, the profile was quickly cut. Peter emphasised the dangers of dust and insisted that extraction be used, especially in the case of MDF. When grinding the edge of this scraper he recommended that we consider mounting grinders so as to give a comfortable working position. It was easy to see the advantages of mounting the machine closer to chest height than to the normal bench height. Peter mounted the square blanks on a scroll chuck. Joe O'Neill pointed out that if you did not have suitable chuck jaws to do this, it

was possible to improvise. Screwing a round wooden disk to a faceplate you can use four wide headed screws on the disk to hold the sides of the square. Removing one screw enables you to slide out a finished piece and insert a new blank.

**'Custom' Bits.** To hollow out the centre of a thimble Peter used a spade bit that he had ground to give a taper to the inside of the walnut workpiece. He left a 'shoulder' to the rear of the bit and this gave him the correct depth without having to bother with a depth gauge. By partially grinding away the centre tip of the bit he got an almost flat bottom to the hole. (I was recently trying to drill flat bottomed holes for the legs in the base of a stool - I had no leeway with the depth of the seat, and a full spade bit would break through the surface of the seat. I could not find any flush Forstner bits in Dublin - plenty of saw-toothed ones - so I had to improvise. I finished up using two spade bits of the same diameter. I started each hole to about one inch with the first, and followed up with the second, on which I had completely ground off the point. So it was a bit crude, but at least it was effective, and this is what the survival of the beginner is all about.)

**Different uses** can be found for any tool, and our demonstrator cunningly used a thread chasing tool to give a texture to the surfaces of the thimble. It was most encouraging too to hear him admit that he has not yet got around to using the chasers for cutting threads. (And you thought it was only you who had tools lying around unused, just waiting for the ideal moment!)

He used a common spanner as a gauge for outer diameters; and by grinding the jaws of another spanner he simplified the scraping of dowels - he ran this tool along the axis of roughly sizes dowelling so quickly and effectively that it almost resembled an extruding machine!

It is also great for us beginners to see advanced turners working away with whatever tool they happen to be holding - this can be a great confidence booster - and Peter gave us many examples of this. There really is more than one way to skin a cat, or to turn a piece of wood.

**Thanks to** Peter Mulvaney for his demonstration. I repeat that these notes are not intended to be a proper and full report of the mornings presentation - and I am too prudent to repeat his jokes! I have tried to set down here just a few of the valuable tips we can all pick up from our more experienced colleagues.
