

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


Tools and Wood



Turning and Learning, Part 12

Chapter Demonstrations.

Michael Fay; Ear-ring Stand.

Michael Fay was the demonstrator at the Dublin Chapter's meeting on August 1st. His ear-ring stand in holly and laburnum was based on a design in Keith Rowley's book "Woodturning Projects". As Michael made quite a number of these items he had found it worthwhile to make a template with all important measurements set out. As you can see from the photo the resulting piece was beautifully proportioned and expertly executed.







Before starting, Michael donned a pair of goggles with prescription lenses - a very sensible precaution, and one which I really will adopt. Another sensible precaution he took was to check the alignment of centres (head and tail) before mounting a disc of holly for the base. He ran the lathe with the disc held by friction while he turned a spigot to suit the chuck. When mounted in the chuck he brought up the tailstock to mark the centre. Then with a Jacob's chuck in the tail he drilled about 10mm deep for the upright. Most of his work was then done with a 3/8 inch fingernail gouge - and to judge from the shavings this

gave a very good finish indeed.



Next Michael turned the upper disc, drilling through the centre. The holes for the ear-ring hooks were made through a metal template which had been accurately drilled in advance. After the first hole he inserted a pin. This and two small clamps holding the metal and wood discs together prevented any slippage while drilling the remaining holes. Michael cleverly avoided drilling right through at this stage. This prevented any "break-out" of the wood, and the holes were completed when he removed more of the face of the disc. Always safety conscious, Michael stressed the importance of disconnecting the lathe during this last process. Before turning off the spigots (using a clever little jam chuck) Michael inscribed two decorative circles on the base - remarking that with two lines or circles they are always equidistant, but with more than two you have to measure! Very obvious but very clever - something else learned!

Being seated close to the Chapter's most enthusiastic conversationalist I may have missed some tips when the laburnum upright was being turned, but you can work out the finer points for yourself. Michael assembled the three pieces for any final touches with the tools and for sanding and finishing with Danish oil. To avoid waiting for glue to set, Michael wound thread (cotton) around the spigots and in this way got a very tight hand fit, and could mount the assembled piece between centres. As a design alternative he suggested dishing the base disc so that it would hold rings. Many thanks to Michael Fay for sharing his wonderful skills with us.

Tony Lally: Beech Monnted Clock.

Tony Lally gave the demonstration at our September 2009 Chapter meeting. Tony had seen an interestingly shaped clock in bronze while browsing in an antique shop on a recent holiday. He has roughly drawn the shape and made a sketch as shown here. Blanks of beech were two discs of 120X50 mm, and for the spindle, 230X50X50 mm.

Tony had pre-shaped a spigot on the spindle to match a hole in the base disc, as well as a smaller spigot at the other end. This enabled him to assemble base and spindle and turn them at the same time. He explained that he mainly uses only a single gouge and a narrow parting tool made from an old hacksaw blade (machine size blade). Before starting work Tony also mentioned the importance of safety glasses - full marks to Michael and Tony.





Working with both base and spindle mounted meant he did not have to re-chuck, and that a good match was ensured. He had thought that the design might look well if the base was fluted but he had not used a router which could be time consuming. He recommended being fairly free in the detail you turn on the spindle (beads, coves etc) as he is not a believer in doing exact copies - "if you think your work is right, then it is right". He mentioned at the start of the demo that he had been a chippie (should that be chippy) by trade, and that became obvious as he referred to the forthcoming tea break **at least ten times.**

Having got a good finish straight from the tools, he mounted the disc for the clock using a temporary spigot held with hot glue. He shaped the face of the





disc and hollowed for the clock stressing that the fit should not be too tight. He embellished the face with some rings and repeated this at the back of the clock space. This was a nice touch that I for one would not have thought of, as the clock will only be removed very occasionally. He drilled a 12mm hole for the vertical piece, shallower than the length of the spigot at the top of the upright. This meant that the bead on the spindle would remain clear of the curved clock mounting, and no unsightly 'miss-match' would occur.. Tony then finished and coated the face, reversed the disc, re-chucked in the clock opening, and removing the temporary spigot completed the shaping and finishing. Of particular note was the fine finish he achieved on the back of the disc, using a very sharp parting tool in a shear cut.


Finally Tony generously auctioned the clock and donated the proceeds to our charity of choice, the Alzheimer's Society. Great demonstration Tony.

Group Work.

At the informal workshop in Templeogue on 10th September we had a good turnout to see John Doran, Seamus Carter and again, Tony Lally turn some pieces on John's lathe. As usual our thanks are due

to Joe O'Loughlin and the Scout troop for letting us use their very spacious premises.

Virtuoso performances on pendants, finials and urns kept us well entertained and many tips were imparted. In addition to the pieces produced on the day we admired some bowls which John had previously made from a piece of walnut veneered kitchen worktop. The piece cut out to take the sink was ready to be dumped when John stepped in to claim it. Now that is the sort of re-cycling we are all happy to do. Actually I have to finish here and dash off. I can hear a chain saw in the distance and can feel the onset of the thrill of the hunt for some more re-cycling. Gerry Ryan, September 2009.









