

# Thursday workshops



# Woodsden - The Almanack of 2005-2009 Competition Results





#### You've Got To Be In It To Win It



The chart above shows the total competition entries in each year. While the overall downward trend is clear, when you consider that 2008 had only 10 competitions instead of 11, 2009 stands out all the more. The advanced (top) competition was stronger than ever in 2009, but by comparison, the entries in the experienced (middle) and beginners (bottom) sections were low.

#### **Early Enthusiasm**



This graph shows the average number of entries per month in all competitions over the 5 years. We are obviously a lot more active in the first half of the year. Things build up to a peak in march and then tail off again as the lighter evenings and summer holidays begin to kick in. The figure for September is

artificially low, again due to the lack of a competition in 2008.

# with Gerry Ryan

#### **Chapter Demonstrations**

John Doran; Table Lamp

The October '09 Dublin Chapter meeting saw the debut of another new-fledged demonstrator from the ranks of the "Thursday School of Turning". John Doran is by no means a newcomer to turning, but the informal atmosphere of the Thursday afternoon sessions had given a number of members the confidence to

take to the big stage. John treated us to a very proficient display, producing one of his favourites - a table lamp using a mahogany square section 'sandwiched' in pine. The result was impressive to say the least.

John starts this project with a perfectly square piece of mahogany to which he glues two opposite side pieces of pine which are cut slightly oversize. ( These are cramped and left overnight.

The slight projections are planed down, and two further lengths of pine (top and bottom in drawing) are glued and clamped. These do not require very accurate planing on the outer face, as the turning process will take care of any extra wood.

Having prepared the blank - for the demo it was approx 3" X 12" - the centre is pre-bored for the cable. John mentioned that there is no reason not to have yet another layer, and he often adds a layer of birch ply which can look very well. He then prepared a spigot to fit the base (for convenience this matched a drill size he had available) and then turned the blank down to a cylinder. While knots may appear in the pine John often adapts the design as he goes along and eliminates the knots in the process. He

worked quickly and effortlessly with a spindle gouge and skew and achieved a very good finish off the tools.

Provided the centre piece was perfectly square, and perfectly centred, the uncovering of the centre wood yields a beautifully proportioned flowing contrast between colours and grains. This was very evident in two large segmented 'eggs' which John passed around. Still giving himself plenty of freedom regarding design and proportion as he progressed, John made a sapele base with some fancy cuts using a fingernail gouge running on the bevel.

The body and base when fitted together harmonized perfectly and this undertaking, along with some of his previous work which he brought along, indicated that John Doran is a demonstrator who will very soon be in demand "on the turning circuit".

#### Jack Kearney; Safe Electrics

Jack combines the ability to make highly ornate and original table lamps, with a formal qualification as an electrician. So we were doubly lucky to have a short talk from Jack at



the October session. The safety requirements for electrical goods are now extremely demanding and complex, and this applies to the table lamps we all make from time to time.

Jack outlined just some of these requirements and demonstrated the range of components that are necessary - and more importantly, where these are available. These include grommets, restrainers, brass bushes etc. Lamp holders must be earthed so a 3 X 0.75 cable is recommended, with earth fittings inside the lamp holder. Three amp fuses must be used and the plug should be marked to this effect. Jack mentioned that components can be obtained from (among

others) Hall Electric, Harold's Cross Road, and also a website (www.s-lilley.co.uk)

Warning. Readers should not rely on these few notes if they want to ensure safe electrical practice. I would recommend that Jack be asked to give a fuller workshop to Chapters, or perhaps he and others could advise the IWG on producing written advice for members.

Our thanks are due to Jack Kearney and I for one will certainly be visiting his stand at the National Craft Fair in the RDS early in December.

#### **Group Work**

I have to admit that I have now got the turning bug so badly that I almost resent going away on holiday if it means missing a session with like-minded zealots. So it is with some regret that I cannot report on what went on in Templeogue in October last. To add to my withdrawal period the advent of the Dublin Chapter AGM meant that we had no demonstration in November. (It was a good AGM and our thanks are due to both the outgoing and incoming office-holders for all their work on our behalf!) However all was well by the second Thursday of November, and it was back to the world of timber.

Adrian Doyle of 'Woodoc' gave us a detailed input on his company's range of wood finishing, restoring and colouring products. Rather than try to repeat all we heard - and these notes are not the place to advertise products - it is sufficient to say that Adrian certainly knows about wood and wood products, and he can be contacted at 085-1639756.

#### Michael's Mushroom

Having passed around a splendid Christmas decoration incorporating a sea urchin, Michael Fay gave a fascinating demonstration in which he produced one of those poisonous red-capped fungi. I hope he will be asked to give a fuller demonstration of this project as I am still not sure how he managed to produce such a very realistic ribbing on the underside by using a texturing tool. By the time he had decorated the top using red and white acrylic paint you could only admire his artistry with turning tools. This of course was not enough to engage the minds of some of his audience who engaged in a detailed debate on "when is a mushroom really a toadstool"?

# New Rota System for Competition Judges

Getting people to volunteer for judging duties has been a problem for a very long time. Regularly an enormous amount of time is wasted while people sit quietly waiting for someone else to put up their hand, until eventually the same group of stalwarts end up putting themselves forward. This situation is simply unfair and has become untenable.

To address the matter, the committee have agreed on a new rota system, which comes into force with immediate effect.

The rota will work on the basis that the first three eligible candidates from a list of attending members will be asked to judge



the competition at the beginning of the meeting.

Having judged the competition, the members names will move to the bottom of the list. Hence, members should not be required to judge another competition for at least 18 months and probably a good deal longer.

Members can, of course, avoid having to judge indefinitely by entering every competition. ©




