# Christmas Crib

Pacelli O'Rourke describes Michael Fay's demonstration of a Nativity Set at the October meeting.

s you can see from the photographs, this is a delightful, seasonal item comprising four elements: Simple, stylised figures of Mary and Joseph and the infant in the manger, mounted on a circular base. There is total discretion as to size and mounting method. I personally felt there was something endearing in the diminutive proportions used by Michael. Any timber can be used, but preferably a hard wood. It also enhances the pleasing look of the piece if the heads contrast with the remainder of the two larger figures.



Michael began by mounting a cylindrical piece about 100mm (4") long by 38mm (1½") in his O'Donnell jaws, with tailstock support. He used a card with markings for the lengths of mounting-spigot, body and shoulders. He achieved a graceful sweep from the base to the shoulder—element. The latter is domed, and now needs to be undercut quite deeply. In fact the basic form of the figure is that of a mushroom. Michael used a homemade tool for the undercutting. Caution! Close work



like this involves high risk of injury. Take your time!

With a Jacob's chuck in the tailstock, drill a 12mm (1/2") hole to a depth of 20mm (3/4"). Now go a further10mm (3/8") with an 8mm (5/16") drill bit. This creates the appearance of a loose 'collar' around the neck.

Making the Shoulders.

First decide which 'side' of the body is to be the front. Now cut a 'slice' off the top at about 45° to the centre line starting the cut about 4mm 'behind' the centre line. A pencil line marking the line of the cut is inscribed. Michael used a Japanese pull-saw for this. It is now that the importance of deep undercutting can be seen as the revealed



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curve of the protruding material, suggests two enfolding arms. Very clever design. The cut edge can be tidied up with a small file and carefully applied fine abrasive. At the opposite end create a spigot for basemounting. At this point the first figure is completed and can be parted off.

# The Head

Michael now changed chucks and mounted a piece of dark timber similar to a pen blank. He fashioned a sphere of about 16mm (5%") with a spigot of 30mm (11%") x 8mm (5/16") to match the bottom portion of the corresponding hole in the top of the body.



The second figure is created in the same way as the first, just bearing in mind that, as one represents Joseph and the other Mary, there ought to be a difference in the overall dimensions of the two.

The Manger.

In essence this comprises the creation of a shallow, natural edge bowl. For this, Michael put up a small lilac branch of 90mm(3½")

length by 50mm(2") girth between centres, with steb-centre drive. The blank is of course mounted side-on to the lathe axis. It is very important to check that this is a true 90° angle. This can be ascertained by rotating the blank and making a mark where each edge passes the tool rest. If the piece is skewed there will be a difference as either end passes a given point. So the blank was 'rounded' and a spigot formed at the tailstock end. This spigot must be a full circle otherwise it could present instability problems when chucked.



The O'Donnell jaws were once again deployed for the safe access they give when working at the headstock end. Remember to make the depression in the 'bowl' quite shallow, otherwise the infant will need to levitate! (Don't even think it!!) The remainder of the stock 'under' the manger is formed into a support pedestal.

Michael urges "nice gentle cuts" in all of this process, Also "Keep your feet steady", most especially when negotiating the wood-airwood dangers of the bowl turning.

Leave a 20mm ( $\frac{3}{4}$ ") spigot for insertion into the base. A long grind gouge is recommended, cutting slightly on the upper wing. A 2mm ( $\frac{3}{32}$ ") hole is drilled through the centre of the manger, this will line up with a hole in the back of the baby using a tooth pick to join the two elements. Leave a mounting spigot of 10mm ( $\frac{3}{8}$ ") at the bottom of the pedestal section.

Be sure you're satisfied with everything before parting off.

### The Baby.

Michael chose to make the body and head separately and in that order. bAgain he used a dark pen-type blank for this section, leaving just enough material protruding from the chuck to give about 50mm (2") clear to work on. The finished profile of the body



looks like the outline of an infant wrapped in a swaddling cloth.

Drill a 5mm (3/16") hole at the "neck" end, to take the head-spigot. The head itself consists of a tiny sphere with spigot to fit into the hole provided in the body. For stability it is best to make the spigot at the tailstock end, then the sphere. This enables the head/body fit to be checked in situ and modified as necessary. The baby can now be parted off.

### The Base.

Michael's finished base was about 100mm (4") in diameter x 16mm (5%"). It is very important that the top face is absolutely level. A variety of mounting methods are possible, expansion and compression being the two most common. Michael has a dislike for the expansion mode because of the danger of the whole piece breaking out. The edge profile of the base is a matter of choice. It's probably best to keep it simple so as not to distract the focus from the figures.



When shaping the edge Michael passed on the tip of lowering the toolrest so as to make the angle between cutting edge and wood more acute, thus enhancing the slicing action and diminishing/eliminating tear-out. Regarding finish: Michael uses HUT wax but of course it is a matter of preference.



Mounting the Figures on the Base.

Michael first marked and cut 3 cardboard templates representing the base of the 3 elements. This enables a very accurate marking of the hole-centres for mounting. You don't want any element over-hanging. A Jacob's chuck was mounted in the headstock, with appropriately sized drill-bit. The base was then wound into the bit to the required depth, making sure that it is held at a true 90° angle. At this point it is a matter of pressing and gluing all the elements together and voilà — a charmingly simple, stylised nativity scene in time for the Holy Season.

As ever, Michael had clearly put meticulous preparation into his demonstration. I'm sure he will be looking forward to seeing the fruits of his labours in the customary seasonal December competition. Many thanks Michael.

# **DCIWG Competition Rules**

29/11/2011

It is a condition of entry that all entrants accept the rules and conditions.

The ruling of the Competition Secretary is final and binding.

The competition is run at the monthly meetings with monthly winners in each category at the meeting and annual winners announced at the A.G.M.

The specification for the competition item will be announced in advance and must be strictly adhered to. No baize to be used on any competition pieces.

Entries will be accepted only up to the start of each meeting.

Competition items must not have been entered in a previous DCIWG monthly competition and must not have the name of the maker visible

Judging: Three judges, one of whom may be a beginner will be selected at each meeting and marks will generally be awarded for form, finish and function. Judging will take place in three categories: Beginners, Experienced, Advanced.

An additional Artistic competition will run at each meeting and will be open to all members.

Marks: Every entrant will receive 5 points. Additional marks will be awarded in each category: -

1 <sup>st</sup>	Additional 10 marks	4 <sup>th</sup>	Additional 4 marks
2 <sup>nd</sup>	Additional 8 marks	5 <sup>th</sup>	Additional 2 marks
3rd	Additional 6 marks	6 <sup>th</sup>	Additional 1 mark


The turner of the year will be determined from the accumulation of the monthly scores to a maximum of ten months. In the event of an entrant having 11 entries, the lowest score will be deducted.

**Promotions:** Beginners are promoted to the Experienced category following two wins or one win and two seconds. Experienced are promoted to the Advanced category following three wins or two wins and three seconds. The turner of the year in both the Beginners and Experienced categories will also be promoted regardless of the number of wins and second places attained.


All promotions will take place at the end of the year and are announced at the A.G.M.

Prizes: The monthly winners in each category will receive a certificate.

Turner of the year prizes: The turner of the year in each category will receive the perpetual trophy for the category, a memento and €100 prize money. In addition, 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> in each category will also receive a certificate.
